








- Human rights are the basic freedoms and rights that belong to <u>every</u> human being!







- During the holocaust about six million European Jews were killed about two-thirds of the population of European Jews.
- Millions of others were also murdered including people with disabilities and anyone who did not agree with the Nazi opinions.
- The total number of Holocaust victims is between 11 million and 17 million people.
- Human rights help to make sure the Government does not misuse their power and harm their citizens.

Protecting people



Article 1.

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

 The Human Rights Act 1998 is a UK law that exists to make sure the UK Government and public bodies, like schools, police and hospitals, protect your human rights.

Human Rights Act 1998

Some of your human rights include:

- Freedom from torture and very cruel treatment (Article 3)
- The right to liberty and security (Article 5)
- The right to have your own thoughts, religion and beliefs (Article 9)
- > The right to privacy and family life (Article 8)
- Freedom of expression and opinions (Article 10)
- The right to meet people and gather in public places (Article 11)
- The right to an education (Article 2 of Protocol 1)
- The right to vote in elections once you reach the voting age (Article 3 of Protocol 1)

Human Rights Act 1998

- Human rights help to ensure every human being has the **freedom** to grow to their **potential**.
- When everyone's human rights are protected and balanced, it helps everyone to get along.
- At school we respect every student's human rights and believe in helping every student to achieve their potential.
- It's important to always try your best at school and to respect each other so you can help to create a **positive learning environment** where **everyone has an equal chance to reach their potential**!

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


Stanley was fed up. It had been SATs all week and now it was raining! Stanley's teacher, Mr. Amir had some exciting news about a class trip.


This trip will be a little different as you get to decide where we go!

Stanley loved the Sea Life Centre and he liked museums too.


But he had been stuck inside for days and wanted to visit the outdoor glamping centre.
