We would like to welcome you and your child to **St. Gerard's Catholic Primary and Nursery School**. Some of you will already be familiar with our school as your child may have spent some time already in our Nursery, or you may have had previous children who were in our Nursery. If this is your first visit to St. Gerard's, we hope that it is a very happy experience, leaving you with the secure feeling that you can contact us at any time if you or your child, have any doubts or worries.

Your child's education and well-being is of paramount importance to us and we recognise that no-one knows your child better than you. We can learn a great deal from you that will enable us to provide a learning environment tailored to the interests and needs of your child. We look forward to a strong partnership between our staff and parents, where you are involved in your child's learning and your views are highly valued.

In addition to Parent Evenings, our school attempts to involve parents in the life and work of the school in many ways. We like to involve parents in every aspect of your child's learning.

Who is Who?

Mr E. Naylor one of our Assistant Headteachers, he is responsible for overseeing the management of our Foundation Stage and is also our Nursery Class Teacher. If you would like to speak to him about anything then please do not hesitate to pop down to Nursery. If for any reason you cannot speak to him then please leave a message with one of our Teaching Assistants and he will come back to you.

Settling Down

For most children Nursery can be quite daunting for the first few weeks. They are likely to be more tired than usual. School makes all sorts of demands on emotional and physical energies.

Even if they settle in well, a few weeks into the term, your child may become clingy or weepy – this is often a reaction to being tired - keep the pressure low and provide opportunity for extra rest and your child will soon settle down again.

There are four themes in the EYFS.

A Unique Child:

This theme is about how children develop: they are all different and their learning needs and styles are unique too. Positive relationships and good communication are vital so that we can plan for individual learning needs. Children need to learn about risks and safety, how to make good choices, and how to stick to boundaries. They do best when their all their physical and emotional needs are met.

Positive Relationships:

This theme is about children learning to manage their feelings and build friendships. We will; Respect all families and aim to develop a positive two-way relationship with parents and carers. Support, listen to and work with children to help them learn.

Enabling Environments:

This theme is about how we plan for, and monitor, each child's progress. We will: Involve parents and the local community. Ensure that inside and outside spaces at the setting are safe, interesting and engaging. Support children when they move on, working as a team to help your child succeed.

Learning and Development:

This theme is about how children learn – through play and exploration, with adult support for each individual. We will: Encourage the children to develop their imaginations, to get actively involved in learning and to make decisions.

Develop their creative and critical thinking, balancing the need for both children and adults to decide what learning should take place.

Working together to make a difference

At St. Gerard's we like to feel that parents are always welcome, because the more parents and teachers can talk to each other informally the more they can build up trust and often resolve minor problems before they turn into major ones.

In addition to Parent Evenings our school attempts to involve parents in the life and work of the school in many ways. We like to involve parents in their children's learning

Nursery Hours

- Morning session 8.45am – 11.45am
- Afternoon session 12.10 pm – 3.10 pm
- All Day Sessions 8.45 am – 3.10 pm (lunch can be purchased at a cost of £2.40 per day this is payable on our LiveKitchen App)
- Snack money is 50p per session and is paid separate to this and is paid directly to the Nursery Staff.

The children walk into the Foundation Stage via the door on the Quinn Street side of our School. We encourage them to walk into school without you. **This is an important first step to independence.**

There will often be times when you may need to speak to the teacher. Whilst we encourage regular parental involvement, please take into consideration that the teacher is very busy welcoming and preparing the children in the morning and therefore you may need to make an appointment with them after school.

The Nursery operates on a password system. If anyone other than yourself is going to be collecting your child please contact the school office, and the person who is collecting your child needs to be aware of the password.

For security, the door will be locked so **it is important for the children to arrive on time.** If you do arrive late, please bring your child to the main entrance of the school.

At home time, your child will be collected from the Foundation Stage door. For your child's safety we will not allow the children to leave until the Teacher has seen you.

Records

While your child is with us, we will record some of the things they do in their learning journey. We take photos and make notes to show how your child is developing using the iPad. These are gathered into a lovely portfolio which is given to you when your child leaves us. You can always ask to see your child's book and we are more than happy to explain anything to you.

We actively encourage you to contribute towards your child's learning journey. All data collected is in line with GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations)

Supporting St Gerard's Catholic Primary & Nursery School at home:

The best ways to support us at home are to:

- Spend lots of time talking with your child;
- Read plenty of books together;
- Encourage your child to take part in lots of activities – digging in the garden, visiting interesting places, taking part in sports.
- Play lots of games together – spending quality time with your child is the very best way to help him or her learn and develop.
- Let us know if your child does something new or interesting.
- Let us know if you have any problems or worries about your child, or if you need our help.

You can also help us to create a holistic picture of your child by writing a comment in their Home/School Book or sharing pictures with us via Class Dojo.

Homework/Home School Book

Home School Books will be sent home on Friday and is expected to be returned by the following Wednesday. It is important that you read through the Learning Log as it will explain what your child has been learning in class that week. Activities will be provided to help you support and secure your child's learning at home.

Outdoor Provision

The children will have access to the Early Years Learning Garden throughout their time in Nursery. Children will access this provision every day and will be using it in all weathers. Please ensure that your child has a suitable warm coat for school and one that doesn't mind getting wet/muddy.

Letters

Letters will be uploaded to our new 'School App' and onto our school website on a regular basis – paper copies can be requested. Please ensure you check your child's bag for any letters/permission slips.

Sickness

We understand that children are occasionally ill and are unable to attend Nursery.

If this is the case then we expect parents to:-

- Contact school before 9.30am.
- On their return to school please provide a short note for our records. Sometimes school will require medical evidence.

The school must be informed by letter or telephone call if a child is absent and the reasons given or in person by the parent/guardian/carer to the School Administration Office.

The school will endeavor to contact parents whose children are not in attendance on the same day of absence. When problems with attendance or punctuality are identified the School's Education Welfare Officer will become involved initially in a supportive way. This may include home visits. Awards are given to classes and individual children for good

attendance. Parents must fill in an Absence Request Form for leave of absence. This may not be authorised

Children are only in school for 190 days.

We expect every child to achieve at least 96% attendance (National average).

Medical Appointments

- If possible please arrange for any medical appointments to be made outside of school time.
- If appointments do have to be made in school time then school requires seeing proof of appointment.

Medicines

Children who are prescribed medicine on a permanent basis must request a consent form from school, which then needs to be completed by you stating what medicine the child takes, the dose and that they need or are able to administer it themselves. These medicines will be stored in a locked cupboard.

Anti-biotics' that are prescribed by the doctor can only be administered by staff if the dosage is four times per day, a form will also need to be completed in order for the school. Children who need inhalers must keep them with them at all times.

Please ensure that there is sufficient medicine in school for your child.

Packed Lunches:

You may prefer your child to bring a packed lunch. Sandwiches, fruit, yoghurt and a fruit drink would be ideal for a healthy mid-day meal.

Please encourage your child to learn how to open – lunch boxes, packets, straws, cellophane, etc. The midday assistants will be there to support your child through lunch times.

Please label your child's lunchbox carefully because children get very upset if they are unsure which one is theirs.

In the interest of **Health and Safety:** No hot food, glass or fizzy drinks, sweets or chocolate!

Fruit

Fruit is free for all children and it will be offered daily. The children will have access to a range of different fruits e.g. apples, satsuma's, bananas, tomatoes and strawberries (when in season). We encourage them to sample as many different ones as possible.

Milk

During the afternoon under 5 years old are given free milk.

Water

Research has shown that children can learn more effectively when they drink plenty of fresh water. As a healthy school, we encourage the children to bring a water bottle with fresh still water every day (not fizzy or flavored water).

Re-usable water bottles are provided free when the children start school and new ones are available to buy when they need replacing.

Charging

If you want your child to have an enriched curriculum with exciting learning opportunities then we expect **all parents to contribute financially.**

If you are experiencing financial hardship please contact Mr Landrum, Mrs McCallum or Mr Naylor who will listen sensitively to your situation.

School Uniform

Our school colours are purple and white.

Boys : Grey Trousers
White Shirt
Purple and White Tie
Purple Sweatshirt with white school badge
Black Shoes (not trainers)

Girls : Grey Skirt
White Shirt, Purple & white Tie
Purple Sweatshirt/Cardigan with white school badge
Black Shoes (not trainers)
White or grey socks or appropriate tights

ALL CLOTHING MUST BE CLEARLY LABELLED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME

In the summer, the boys wear grey trousers and White Shirt School tie Short grey trousers may also be worn. Girls may wear **lilac** gingham dresses (and purple cardigan if desired.) The purple sweatshirt/cardigan with the school badge may be worn throughout the year.

We ask parents for full support for the correct school wear. The child in uniform identifies with their school and friends.

Their attitude and neat dress is reflected in good school work.

TRAINERS/CONVERSE ARE NOT PART OF SCHOOL UNIFORM – PLEASE ENSURE YOUR CHILD HAS THE CORRECT FOOTWEAR

No jewellery (including studs or sleepers) is allowed.

Extreme haircuts including 'passing' fashions are not appropriate in our school where our high standards of appearance are viewed with pride.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Parent Access to School

Parents are not permitted to walk through school with their child to class; the child will be accompanied by a member of staff.

Parents wishing to see a member of staff should speak to Mrs. Roach or Miss Gilbert in the school office.

No dogs are allowed in the School Playground. Anyone who does bring a dog into the school playground will be asked to leave.

Smoking

Our school is a no smoking area. This applies to staff, parents and visitors. Smoking is not permitted in school or around the areas of the school.

Children are taught in the science curriculum about the health dangers of smoking.

Car Park

The staff car park should only be used by staff and any disabled visitors.

Please do not park directly outside the school where the yellow lines are visible.

Please consider our local residents when parking around the school.

Safety of children

Children must be collected from school at 3:10pm by a responsible adult. Children under the age of 16 should not be collecting siblings from school. If someone else is collecting your child from school other than you, please inform the school as early as possible.

We understand that there are some parents who request that the child's mother or father does not pick up their child or have access to the child in school. The safety of your child is important to us and sometimes this can put the school in a difficult position if the adult still has parental rights. If this is the case the only way we can refuse access is if we have a solicitor's letter stating that mother or father does not have parental rights. A copy of this letter should be kept in the child's confidential file in the school office.

If you change your telephone number or mobile number throughout the year **it is important** that you let us know about it. There have been times when we have tried to contact parents and we have been unable to. This also applies to change of addresses or any other information that you think the school needs to know.

If you are wishing to change schools we advise that firstly you speak to the Headteacher before making this decision as sometimes moving a child from school can cause distress but we understand that often it is unavoidable due to family circumstances. However it is advisable to let the Headteacher know you are considering changing schools before making this important decision.

Parent Code of Conduct

At St Gerard's Catholic Primary and Nursery School we are very fortunate to have supportive and friendly parents and carers.

We expect parents and carers to show respect and concern for others by:-

- supporting the respectful ethos of our school by setting a good example in their own speech and behaviour towards all members of the school community;
- working together with teachers for the benefit of children.
- correcting own child's behaviour, especially in public where it could otherwise lead to conflict, aggressive or unsafe behaviour;
- respecting the school environment, including keeping the school tidy by not littering.
- following the parking rules and doing the right thing when delivering and collecting children from school.
- In order to support a peaceful and safe school environment, the school cannot tolerate:-
- disruptive behaviour which interferes with the operation of a classroom, an office area or any other part of the school grounds;
- using loud and/or offensive language or displaying temper;
- threatening harm or the use of physical aggression towards another adult or child.
- damaging or destroying school property;
- abusive or threatening emails, phone or social network messages ;
- smoking and consumption of alcohol or other drugs or accessing the school site whilst intoxicated ;

The above behaviour on school premises will be reported to the appropriate authorities and Governors may prohibit an offending adult from entering the school grounds to safeguard our school community.

Complaints Procedure

The **first** point of contact is the child's teacher. If you are not satisfied with the outcome the next point of contact is the Headteacher, Mr. Landrum. Every complaint will be listened to and investigated fully and dealt with as quickly as possible.

Parents will be informed of the outcome.

If you are not satisfied with the outcome then...

The **second** point of contact is the Chair of Governors, Mrs C Godwin

She can be contacted by letter addressed to him and marked 'private and confidential'. The letter should be handed to the school office.

Other Governors including the Parent Governor must not be contacted or consulted with regard to any complaint at any stage. This is to prevent them becoming tainted and therefore excluded from any disciplinary committees that may be required as a result of the complaint.
